Sir

You may certify in one or more of thirteen (13) different positions, ranging from Flight Control Officer to Commanding Officer. - Participation in this program is entirely voluntary, and is not required to hold any position in STARFLEET. Academy Degree Program (ADP) Here is where you gather all the certificates you have earned over the years and earn Academy-wide degrees. 


